Individuals experiencing symptoms of COVID-19 must self-isolate until their symptoms cease or until they have a negative test result.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>□ Effective through April 10, 2020 (at 5pm), all individuals in the City and County of Denver to stay at their place of residence, to maintain social distance of at least 6-feet when outside of their residence and to only leave their residences for essential activities, essential governmental functions or to operate essential businesses.</li> <li>□ All travel is prohibited, except for essential travel and essential activities.
